What topics will the students learn today?

ELA – Students will be publishing their journalistic articles on the San Francisco Earth Quake and Fire. Articles were crafted using research and facts acquired through non-fiction text, as well as our realistic fiction novel *Dragonwings*. Students used the book as a model to respond to our focus question: Can I determine different perspectives surrounding the same event using research for the San Francisco Earthquake & Fire? Our next writing piece will be an argument based essay. Students will explore the benefits & harmful consequences of the use of controversial pesticides.

Math – During June sixth grade will be reviewing all 5 topics of our curriculum; ratios and proportional relationships, the number system, expressions and equations, geometry, statistics & probability.

Science – Students will continue to explore the ecosystem unit. They will explore the ecosystem with a concentration on sharks. Students will also distinguish among facts and reasoned judgment based on research findings on various species of sharks. The students will then compare information that they have researched gained from reading a scientific text with information gained from video and multimedia sources. They will also cite textual evidence to support analysis of a claim of whether or not certain species continue to exist in the oceanic ecosystem based on various resources.

Social Studies – During June the students will identify the characteristics and contributions of the Roman Empire.
