What topics will the students learn today?

ELA – Students will read <u>A Long Walk to Water</u> and analyze how setting shapes characters throughout the story. They will collect textual evidence as they read to use in our next writing assignment, a five-paragraph response to literature. Students will analyze how an author develops and contrasts the points of view of different characters in the text. We will read non-fiction articles that accompany the novel to gain a better understanding of the unique culture described in the book.

Math - This month the students will solve real-life and mathematical problems using numerical and algebraic expressions and equations.

Science – Our 7^{th} Grade Science students have been working in Focus Groups to gain an in depth understanding of a specific Environmental Issue that they have been assigned. These are issues that impact us both locally and internationally. Students team up with their group members to collect data, explore possible solutions, and to create a trifold demonstration board pertaining to their topic. Groups will be presenting their group reports in the format of an interactive oral presentation from which the other groups will take notes and become knowledgeable of the issue through peer teaching. Focus Group presentations will be conducted on both Wednesday December 19, and Thursday December 20th during regularly scheduled classes. The overall goal of our projects is for students to gain firsthand knowledge of the importance of human guidance in maintaining the existence of our earth's biodiversity so as to assure the vitality of ecological areas.

Social Studies – This month our Social Studies Scholars will be exploring Unit 2, The Road to Independence and will investigate the French and Indian War, Colonial Response to Taxation, Cause/Effects of the Revolution, key battles of the war, and Declaration of Independence. This will lead to our study of "Hamilton, An American Musical" connected to the people. cvents, and ideas of the time.

Science - Students are reading the works and scientific findings from a wide range of historical and modern-day scientists in both printed materials and on the internet based on their own research. Students are urged to continue their research with their groups during lunch periods (they are welcome to come to the science room), or at home outside of school. All sources must be recorded for reference.

REMINDERS!

Students should be reading 20-30 minutes each day and writing three independent reading responses per week in their homework notebooks.

Students should be checking Google Classroom every night for S.S. homework and school-wide reminders. Videos are being posted as studying resources. Students are also encouraged to conduct their own research projects outside of school for extra credit and can design their own research questions.

Students are responsible for maintaining organized and complete Science notes and lab books to assure that they have accurate resources for the topics that we are exploring. Random notebook checks are conducted routinely. Students are welcome to come up to my room during their lunch period for my assistance in helping them with note taking and organization.
