What topics will the students learn today?

ELA - In January, students will begin by presenting their H2O projects and reflecting on their efforts. Next, we will work on their third major writing piece, a Response to Literature. Specifically, students will have to explain how setting (time, place and culture) shapes the characters in <u>A Long Walk to Water</u>. Our focus will be on citing text evidence to support our inferences and on using the steps in the writing process. We will spend the next few weeks reading poetry and learning poetic techniques, before diving into our next major novel, <u>Lyddie</u>.

Math – This month the students will solve real-life and mathematical problems using numerical and algebraic expressions and equations.

Science – This month the students will analyze how animals and plants adapt physically and behaviorally to the elements of their natural habitats. The interconnection between biotic and abiotic factors that exist within ecosystems to ensure balanced healthy biodiversity will be the focus of our investigations. Focus groups presented their Environmental Issues and will continue to serve as peer teachers for classmates on information relating to their topics.

Social Studies – This month our Social Studies Scholars will be concluding their study of the Road to the Independence with a study of the Declaration of Independence, key battles of the Revolution and Articles of Confederation. We will also begin our Hamilton the Musical song analysis group project investigating the people, events, and ideas of the time. Finally, we will be launching Unit 3: A New Nation and focus on the crafting of the United States Constitution and presidency of George Washington.
