WHAT ARE WE STUDYING?

Literacy:

Word Study - Students were introduced to our new word study program "Fundations" in October. In November, students will be introduced to digraphs and the bonus letter rule.

Each week new sight words and high frequency words will be introduced. There is a spelling test at the end of each week. Students are responsible for knowing previous weeks and current week words!!

Reading Workshop - November theme: students will continue to read nonfiction books.

Please continue to read daily with your child – encourage him/her to use print strategies to figure out difficult words, retell the story in sequence and ask questions about the text. Encourage your child to read more non-fiction. These books can be about true events and real people or animals.

Social Studies – November theme: Families, Now and Long Ago. Readers will read about life long ago and how families have a past and change over time.

Writing Workshop - Writers will write an informational piece using facts learned in class.

In writing, students should continue to work on letter formation, using capitals and punctuations correctly, and finger spacing between words.

Math:

Module 2 – Student will be introduced to Place Value Through Addition and Subtraction Within 20.

News/Information/Tips/Reminders

- Please sign your child's homework every night.
- Please check your child's red dot notebook for nightly homework and school notices.
- It is very important not to go ahead in workbooks as homework reflects work completed in class.
- Red folders, red dot notebooks, and math books should be returned to school everyday.
- Any notes/letters to your child's teacher should <u>not</u> be written in their red dot notebook. Please write on a separate paper.
- All monies should be in a sealed envelope labeled with your child's name.
- Please be aware that in first grade students are responsible for unpacking/packing their supplies. Encourage your child to unpack their red folders, red dot notebooks and math book.
 Discuss what homework is assigned for the evening.
- You and your child should be reading for 20 minutes each night.
- Dress your child appropriately for the weather. Keeping in mind that our classrooms get warm, but that it is getting cooler outside, layering works best.
- As always, please label your child's clothing and lunch boxes so they can be returned in case they get misplaced.
- Remember you have Zearn Math as a resource for your child.
 This is a valuable tool and contains resources that your child can participate in.
